Artifact Spotlight: *The Pastel Box*

Exploring Fairfield House after there were no longer Fairfields in residence brought many surprises. One of these was an unpainted wooden box about 7³/₄ inches long, 5¹/₄ inches wide, and not quite 1¹/₄ inches high. The surprise comes when the hinged top is lifted to reveal the remains of a set of pastels. Judging by the only 2 nearly whole sticks, the box once contained 40 sticks. What remains in the box are fragments of vibrant hues nestled on top of cotton wool. The box has all the signs of the set having been well used. Purple appears to have been the artist's favorite colour, as there is barely any of that pastel remaining

The inside of the box cover retains a printed paper label in French. The Girault factory, established in 1780, specialized in "superfine pastels, Soft and hard" and had won a medal at the Universal Exposition of1878. This helps date the box. Girault Pastels continue to be handmade by a successor firm.

Who among the Fairfields was a pastel artist? A 1893 letter among the Fairfield Correspondence gives us one clue that Maria, daughter of Harmon and Alice Fairfield, worked in pastels. Maria, born 2 October 1830, lived her life at the Fairfield farm.

This excerpt from a letter to Maria from her friend confirms that Maria was fond of art and that the pastel box may have belonged to her. We know that the pastels came to the Fairfields sometime after 1878, based on dating from the label.

Unhappily, no works in pastels remained in Fairfield House to show us what caught Maria's eye and artistic energies. Dear Maria, January 4th 1893 Do you ever paint/pastel pictures now-a-days? Do the peonies and lilies bloom in the front yard? Are the red raspberries as large and as sweet as they used to be? Sincerely, Sallie Seaton

Two paintings of the homestead remained in Fairfield House in 1973: an oil painting done in the last quarter of the 19th century and a watercolour done in 1955.

The oil painting was done by an unidentified artist on academy board. It measures $21\frac{3}{4}$ "by $17\frac{1}{2}$ ", with a gilt gesso frame. Dating clues come from two sources.

The back of the painting has the label of F.W. Devoe, art supply manufacturer and dealer. The New York address on the label was in use by 1878, but not

earlier than 1873.

The second clue comes from a photograph of the house dated circa 1885.

Art Lessons?

The Kingston British Whig of Oct 1, 1888 carried an ad that fits into the time frame for the pastel and painting Sallie Seaton mentioned. Classes had were resumed. Students could learn how to paint with oils and water colours and to

draw with pastel and crayon.

20th Century Work

The watercolour of the house was painted in 1955 by V. Reed and was given to the Fairfields. It is measures $16\frac{1}{2}$ " by $23\frac{1}{2}$ " and is held in a beautiful wooden frame. This painting shows the familiar east side of Fairfield House, but cleared of most of the vines visible in the 1885 painting.

Does anyone have information about V. Reed?





JRR 1361 CabIV (Staples)

In the Toronto Public Library Special Collections there is a third artistic rendering of the House, along with a black and white photograph on which the painting is based. The painting, done in 1911, is attributed to Owen Staples.

The artist used watercolour and gouache, over pencil on watercolour board. Inscribed on the back is simply the word "Fairfields". The photograph of the house (right), taken sometime in the 1880s. The painting measures 276 x 260mm.

A Closer Look: Examine these paintings and photographs. All show the same

side view of the house, but the trees and vines differ somewhat in each picture. See how wild and uncontained the vines look in the oil painting in comparison to the 1955 watercolour? Such clues can help us in dating the paintings and photographs and also in tracking the history of greenery and plant life here at Fairfield House.
